



Multiple Storms Expected this Week

Good afternoon, A series of storm systems will pass through the area over the next week, each producing periods of strong winds and moderate to heavy rain. In addition, there will be high surf and tidal flooding concerns along the coast. This will be a warm event, akin to a "Pineapple Express," so snow levels will remain well above pass levels, with no winter weather hazards expected outside of the higher mountain peaks. Details on expected impacts through this week are below.

KEY POINTS

- **Multiple fronts this week, each bringing periods of strong winds and moderate to heavy rain.**
- **Fast moving, compact offshore surface low will produce strong winds and rain along the coast Monday evening.**
- **A larger, robust storm arrives Tuesday afternoon into Wednesday morning, producing widespread gusty winds and heavy rain.**
- **A slightly weaker, but still vigorous storm then arrives Thursday, with another round of strong winds and moderate to heavy rain.**
- **Also Thursday, high surf conditions and runoff from recent rain will combine with King Tides to produce high water levels along the coast. Dangerous beach conditions are likely, along with some minor flooding along low lying estuaries such as Coos Bay.**
- **Flooding is not expected, but localized streams and creeks may overflow, and drainages blocked by leaves and debris could cause standing water on area roads.**
- **Snow levels should be high enough to keep any concerns over the highest peaks. All area passes should remain below snow levels.**

WEATHER RISK OUTLOOK

Risk levels incorporate potential impacts from weather hazards and likelihood of occurrence for a reasonable worse case scenario.


WHAT	WHEN	WHERE	IMPACTS
Strong Winds Confidence: High	Monday afternoon and evening, then Wednesday	All areas, esp. coastal highlands, Shasta Valley, east side terrain	Gusty southerly winds are expected across multiple periods through this week. A compact low could bring gusty winds to coastal highlands on Monday afternoon and evening. Gusts of 60 mph will be possible for coastal areas including Pistol River, Cape Blanco, Cape Arago, and exposed portions of Highway 101. Winds from this low ease by early Tuesday morning. A significant front will bring widespread southerly wind gusts on Wednesday morning and afternoon. Areas of concern for Wednesday include coastal areas south of Cape Blanco, Shasta Valley, and over east side terrain. A second front on Thursday may bring additional widespread gusty winds, but forecast speeds do not currently reach hazardous thresholds.
Heavy Rain Confidence: High	Through the week	All areas, esp. west of and along the Cascades	Rainfall is expected through the week. The highest rainfall amounts are forecast over Curry and western Siskiyou Counties, where total rainfall amounts may exceed 5 inches by the end of the week. Areas north of Cape Blanco, along the Cascades, and in the Mount Shasta region (Dunsmuir, Mount Shasta City, McCloud) will also receive substantial rainfall. Periods of moderate to heavy rainfall will be possible for most areas, especially west of the Cascades and with Wednesday's front. With elevated snow levels, winter weather is not a concern through this week. While low river levels and an absence of snowpack are minimizing rainfall-related flooding concerns, urban ponding in areas with poor drainage is possible and visibility while traveling may be impacted.
Coastal Concerns Confidence: High	Thursday	Coastal areas, tidal estuaries in Coos Bay	In addition to periods of gusty winds discussed above, a combination of conditions may bring hazardous coastal conditions. Advisory-level surf of 23 to 26 feet is forecast on Thursday. Additionally, high "king" tides are forecast to coincide with high surf. Coastal infrastructure and equipment may be vulnerable to crashing waves, and coastal erosion is likely. Inland flooding may be possible for low-lying areas and coastal estuaries in Coos Bay, including parts of highways 101, 42, 241 and East Bay Road.



Max Gusts Monday


Expected Maximum Wind Gusts Tues - Wed


Max Gusts Tuesday Afternoon through Wednesday

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Total Expected Rainfall




Probability of 5.00" or Greater in 72hrs

Probability of 5 inches or more of rain.


High Surf Risk for Wed/Wed Night
